WHAT IS REVENGE TRAVEL?

Revenge travel is basically the idea of taking "revenge" on Covid by travelling after almost two years of being locked down during the pandemic.





- ➤ Prior to the pandemic, Philippine tourism began to assert itself as a rising star in the country's economy.
- ➤ Some figures pre-pandemic : (2019)
 - almost 12% of the GDP
 - earned almost P3 trillion in revenues from inbound and domestic travel
 - employed 5.5 million people directly
 - visitor arrivals reached an all-time high of 8.26 million.
- The Philippines was poised to be a breakout destination in 2020 and beyond.
- Borders were closed to leisure travelers since mid-March of 2020.





- International arrivals disappeared as other countries closed borders and limited travel for their nationals.
- ➤ Only returning Filipinos and Overseas Foreign Workers along with members of the diplomatic corps and special visas were allowed to enter but with quarantine and testing requirements.
- ➤ LGUs in the Philippines also restricted interisland travel and virtually sealed off provinces to prevent the spread of COVID.
- ➤ Hotels, travel agencies, tour operators, tourist transport and other stakeholders suspended operations.
- Accommodations were eventually allowed to reopen and used as quarantine facilities.





- ➤ An estimated 1 million jobs in the tourism industry were lost during the pandemic.
- Workers were also put on temporary leave or lay-offs.
- > Tourist transport operators lost their vehicles.



MANILA, Philippines — The decline in demand from the business travel and the meetings, incentives, conventions and exhibitions (MICE) sectors are some of the factors that may prompt hotels to temporarily close their facilities, according to a hospitality consultancy firm.



- Domestic tourism slightly rebounded with the loosening of entry requirements to popular destinations in the 4th Quarter of 2021 but was again affected by the Omicron variant surge in early 2022.
- ➤ Last January 28, 2022, the government announced that fully-vaccinated tourists from countries that required no visas to enter the Philippines will be allowed to come in subject to pre-arrival testing and having travel insurance with Covid coverage starting Feb. 10, 2022.
- From Feb. 10-16, a total of 13,360 passengers foreign tourists came in.
- Top 3 source markets were the United States, Canada and the United Kingdom.

- Most of the foreign tourists that arrived came from the long haul markets such as Europe and North America.
- ➤ Domestic tourism also started to increase as the numbers of cases of Omicron infections began to creep downward and LGUs again loosened restrictions.
- ➤ Demand continues to remain robust for the following months and we expect more for the winter season of 2022 barring any unforeseen events.
